News From the SEO

An ABC class is being planned for July. Dates and location have not yet been determined. Susan Darcy, Leo Robillard, and John Holden are leading that effort.

A GPS seminar was held. It was attended by one person from the Albany area and David Trudeau. An additional GPS seminar will be held in the fall in conjunction with the Geodetic Mark part of the Cooperative Charting program (see article). We can also use the GPS training to hold a geocaching event. I know where most of the caches are on the campus of Berkshire Community College, and would like another shot at finding the one I couldn't locate recently. The exact date will be announced later.

Sunrise, Sunset, and Twilight

- Defining when Daylight and Darkness Occur By Tom Dailey, JN

When traveling by boat around the clock offshore, and out of sight of land with an unobstructed horizon, you get to observe (in clear weather) the true rising and setting of the sun. This leads to defining the time of sunrise and sunset which is commonly tabulated in almanacs and weather forecasts. Sunrise and sunset are defined as the time when the upper edge of the sun's disc lies on the unobstructed horizon. The exact time at which you observe this phenomenon depends on many factors including atmospheric conditions, your elevation, sea conditions, and on land, the terrain of landscape which you look over.

In observing sunrise and sunset at sea you notice, however, that the sky has already brightened before the sun rises and continues in brightness after the sun sets. This brings up the subject of twilight, which is the period between sunset and darkness and darkness and sunrise during which some outdoor activities can continue without artificial light, for some limited time. In marine navigation and Power Squadron courses we utilize two periods of twilight: civil twilight and nautical twilight. Civil twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening when the center of the sun lies 6 degrees below the horizon. During this period ordinary outdoor activities can be performed without artificial illumination. Nautical twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening when the center of the sun lies 12 degrees below the horizon. During this time (and in the absence of other illumination) general outlines of objects may be distinguishable, but detailed outdoor operations are not possible. A third defined period of twilight (not generally discussed or used in the Power Squadron) is astronomical twilight. Astronomical twilight is defined as the period beginning in the morning and ending in the evening when the center of the sun lies 18 degrees below the horizon. Before astronomical twilight begins in the morning and ends in the evening there is no sky illumination from the sun, making objects practically imperceptible.

To learn more about the sun and stars and how they can be used in marine navigation consider taking the Power Squadron's Junior Navigation and Navigation courses.

Chasing the Little Round Discs

The Cooperative Charting program used to consist of two parts. One is what we think of in relation to navigational aids found in the water. US Power Squadrons® members participate in the program by reporting the location of the aids. This data is used to assist in keeping charts up to date, as occasionally the aids disappear or are moved during a storm. The second part of the program was locating discs that were embedded in things such as rocks as part of the US Coast and Geodetic Survey. You may have seen some of these markers if you've been hiking to the top of mountains or even around town. The land-based part of the program was more suited to



those of us here, who are more likely to find the markers than to find navigational aids. Some of us from Berkshire Sail & Power Squadron participated in the program at one time, and I wrote a previous Log article (same title) a few years back. The land-based part of the program was discontinued for a while, but has now returned, effective immediately. Program participation consists of looking up the location of geodetic marks in the area, and then setting out with a GPS and the location and description of the markers. The results of the search are then reported. Only markers that haven't been reported in the last two years are reported. Some of the markers no longer exist, and that should also be reported. Have you ever seen the east end of the Hoosac Tunnel? I'd never seen it until we went looking for a marker there.

This coming October or November, we will offer the GPS seminar to familiarize people with a GPS as used on land. Upon completion of the seminar, we will organize into teams, divide up the available marks by area, and see what we can find. I have six GPS units that we can use. We will offer the training on one evening, and then set out on a Saturday to search. Check for more information in the next Log.

He was a great friend to many of us. He will be missed.
