

District 2 Fall Conference Educational Awards

Berkshire won a number of educational awards at the District 2 Fall Conference, held in Fishkill, NY on October 17. We won the Stamford-Doolittle Award, for the best teaching aid at the Fall Conference. That aid, pictured at left, is one of the aids we use for knot tying in ABC and Seamanship. Although it's simple, it meets the criteria of easy to replicate, inexpensive to build, and accomplishes the goal for which it is intended. It will be entered into the competition in Orlando in February. That competition features the best aid from each district.

We also won the Prince Henry Award, which is based on the number of completions of Junior Navigation and Navigation. Both John Holden and I completed Navigation during the educational year ending in June. Each of the two awards consist of a plaque, to which the name of the winning squadron is added each year. We will have to return the plaques at next year's Summer Council.

We also won the N Club Award. The N Club is composed of people who have completed the Navigation course. The local chapter awards three sextants each year (one each to districts 2, 3, and 4. The top award is a metal sextant, and the other two are plastic sextants. In general, the criteria are about the same as those used for the Prince Henry Award. We were fortunate, however, to win the metal sextant for top overall. This sextant becomes squadron property to keep. It will be available for use by those of you who take Junior Navigation or Navigation in the future.

I also received my Senior Navigator plaque.

Upcoming Courses

Once the holidays are over, we will begin winter course offerings. One possible offering will be the Weather course. It runs about 8 weeks, one night a week, two hours a night, and I believe it's possibly the best course we offer. It deals with everything from tornadoes to hurricanes to fronts and clouds. We could, however, offer a weather seminar instead. It would be one two hour class. It's obviously much less detailed, but provides basic knowledge.

Another possible offering is Piloting. We have a number of people who have not taken Piloting. This class runs about 8 weeks, and involves use of a GPS, as well as plotting courses on charts, which is a skill necessary for determining your position, should your electronics fail.

A third possibility is Instructor Development. This course is of value to anybody who has to address a group. It's a life skill, and doesn't involve any USPS-specific skills or background. It involves making a five, ten, and fifteen minute presentation in front of the class. The class members and instructor will critique each of the presentations, in order to help you improve your skills. At the end, you need to create a lesson plan for a one hour class, which will be graded by the course instructor and submitted to the USPS Instructor Development Committee. This course runs 4-5 weeks, one night a week.

An updated GPS seminar is under development. I'm hoping it will be released soon. Once it's available, we will offer that.

A fourth possibility is the Navigation Systems course. This is the third part of the Marine Electronics series (the other two are Marine Electrical Systems and Marine Communication Systems. This course uses the Canadian Power Squadron text, supplemented by US-specific material.

Descriptions of these courses are available on the USPS web site under the Education Department.
