Knowing Your Member Benefits

One of the reasons for being a member of USPS is that a number of benefits come with your membership. Most people may know about some of the benefits, but it can be difficult to keep up with all the benefits available. One way to do that is to go to the Member Benefits page (after logging in), scroll through the benefits, and look at the details for those that interest you.

Today we are going to look at one of the newer benefits – Vision Service Plan (VSP). If you don't have vision insurance, exams and contacts or glasses can be expensive. Even with insurance these items are not cheap, but VSP coverage will help hold down the costs. VSP coverage can be for one, two, or a family. The payments can be paid once for the year or by monthly payment.

To see the details, log in to the usps.org site. The top entry in the left menu is Member Benefits. Select that and you will be taken to the member benefits main page. VSP is the center entry in the top row. Select "Click here for details" to be taken to the VSP page After reading the page content, select "CLICK HERE" at the end of the article. That will take you to another page with tabs that describe the program. From there you can enroll on line or by phone.

SEO Report

We've had a quiet season as far as courses go (none). A couple were offered, but no one responded. I did not get to making calls to see about getting students. Unfortunately, I've been a bit busy preparing for my upcoming move, and haven't spent as much time on this as I should have.

One of the planned developments in the educational area is breaking up some of the 8 week courses into individual 1 week segments, so that people can pick and choose what specific topics are of interest to them. Another development is the plan to offer course manuals in pdf, rather than hard copy. Seamanship will be the first – probably early next year. Non-members taking courses other than ABC3 will be charged a \$20 exam fee to reflect the cost of maintaining records for non-members. There's a new Digital Media Library (uspsdml.org). It has videos on selected topics that you may find useful to use in a particular course or for advertising.

I attended the District 2 Fall Conference in early October. For the first time in a while, Berkshire didn't win any of the awards related to education. We have a couple of people currently taking the Navigation course; if they complete it successfully, we might get an award next year.

I guess it's time for another mailing to try to see if there are any courses that would be of interest to people. There are a large number of seminars available which only run two hours. Those can be done in one night, rather than 8 or more weeks. Included in this edition of the Berkshire Log is a card you can return to indicate interest.

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Exploring Sebago Lake

On the first Sunday in August my Mom, wife, and I headed for "the West Coast of Maine" for our annual week of exploring new flat waters. Our antique 1936 Old Town 18' Sea Model powered by a 1957 Evinrude Lark 35 has not been back to Maine since leaving the factory June 11, 1936. 7 hours later after several wrong turns we checked in at The Agustus Bove House in Naples. The former Naples Hotel is now a charming Bed & Breakfast hosted by Arlene Stetson with 19th century charm, linen napkins and china place settings. We launched our boat at the Naples Marina to explore Brandy Pond. Before we had a chance to pull out of our slip a man paddled up in his kayak and introduced himself as Rick. He had seen us from across the lake and invited us to join his group The Mountainview Woodies and tour the lakes with them.

If you're not familiar with the area, Brandy Pond is connected to Long Lake to the north and Sebago lake via the Songo River to the south. There's nearly 50 miles of boating available. The dam and lock on the river constructed in 1830 is the oldest non-powered manually operated lock in the country, and maintains the 5 foot elevation difference between the lakes to allow boat traffic. This lock is bordered by an old swing bridge, hand operated with a large "key". Enough geography.

On Monday after a short tour boat ride on the Songo River Queen we explored Brandy pond and Long Lake on our own, with lunch at the Village Dock in Harrison; then down to the Songo Lock before heading back to the Marina for dinner. Tuesday Rick led a group of 3 Lymans, a Chris-craft, a Penn Yan, a Correct Craft, and our Old Town through the lock and into Sebago Lake. After crossing the lake we arrived at Camp Sunshine, a camp for seriously ill children, where we were treated to a wonderful lunch with the campers. Following lunch we reciprocated by taking the kids and councilors for boat rides around the lake. What a thrill for both the campers and us. As the afternoon drew to a close and we began our trip back across the lake a storm blew in from the south soaking us as the occasional wave broke over our bow and the spray constantly came over our windshield. Wednesday the weather was still unsettled so we visited the bridge and lock by land and in the evening we ventured up to Harrison by boat for an ice cream dessert. On Thursday Rick again led us through the lock and across Sebago Lake to Mijis Resort for a steak bake and afternoon of swimming. On Friday we said our goodbyes as more boat and car owners began to arrive for the Annual Naples Antique & Classic Boat Show.

There's much great boating within a days drive of home; the Power Squadron courses and seminars have given me the confidence to explore these waters. So far we've trailered our boat for vacations on the New York Finger Lakes, Lake Champlain, Indian Lake, and have camped on the Connecticut River and Lake George. On Sundays we day-trip to Harriman Reservoir and Lake Bomoseen in Vermont, Saratoga Lake, Great Sacandaga Lake, and the Hudson River in New York. George Reynolds From the Mouth of Moby Dick
