The Whale Gourmet (Recipes for Every Galley)

These recipes are from long ago but in looking out the window at the snow, it seems like snacks or treats might be needed. They work well at home or on the boat. One of the most difficult things to have enough of are snacks. Here are three recipes for snacks you've probably made but have forgotten about. Make them at home and you won't have as much mess on the boat. They keep well in airtight containers — to make it easy and quick to serve, before putting the snacks in the containers, divide into individual plastic bags — enough to snack on during your pre-dinner social hour or for a light snack.

Honey Holiday Mix

2 cans Honey Roasted Almonds

6 cups unsalted popcorn

2 cups (10 oz) chow mien noodles

5 tbsp. margarine 3 tbsp. sugar 1 tsp. vanilla

1 tsp. ground cinnamon

1 cup golden raisins

Preheat your oven to 250° F and combine in large, shallow roasting pan the popcorn and chow mien noodles. Melt margarine and sugar. Stir in vanilla and cinnamon. Pour over popcorn and toss to coat. Bake 1 hour, stirring every 20 min. Stir in almonds and raisins. Spread on paper towels to cool. Makes 11 Cups.

Hidden Valley Ranch Oyster Crackers

3/4 cup salad oil

1 envelope (1.0 oz.) Hidden Valley Milk Recipe Original Ranch Salad Dressing Mix

1/2 tsp. dill weed

1/4 tsp. lemon pepper

1/4 tsp. garlic powder

12 - 16 oz. plain oyster crackers

Whisk together the first five ingredients. Pour over crackers, stirring to coat. Place on baking sheets and bake at 275° F for 15-20 minutes. Makes 11-12 cups.

Popcorn Granola Munch

8 cups popped corn

1 cup wheat germ

1/2 cup shredded coconut

1 cup rolled oats

1/2 cup sesame seeds

1/2 cup creamy peanut butter

1 tbsp. water

1 tbsp. oil

1/2 cup molasses

2 tbsp. honey

Preheat oven to 300° F. In a bowl combine popped corn, wheat germ, coconut, rolled oats, and sesame seeds. Heat peanut butter, water, oil, molasses, and honey in a saucepan. Pour the heated ingredients over the popcorn mixture and stir well. Spread on a greased baking sheet and bake for 30 minutes, stirring often. Makes 2-1/2 qts.

Check the Chart

A small diamond shaped navigational aid sitting atop a steel pole warns of "rocks" in letters so small even the use of binoculars can't distinguish them. If you are close enough to read the message on the aid, you risk going aground.

Navigational aids are boaters' road signs, much like signs on a highway, they direct you to safe passage. When accompanied by a chart of the area, they provide valuable information. Many boaters recognize cans, nuns and day beacons but others such as spherical red and white balls or diamond shaped aids can be confusing. If you do not understand the aids purpose or don't have a chart to identify it, you could have a major problem.

The ability to read a chart overcomes the limitations of navigational equipment. A GPS, not equipped with a chart screen such as C charts, shows the direction to a position but the direction shown is "as the crow flies" (a straight line). It will not indicate shallows, reefs or even a land mass between two points.

Charts show red and green navigational aids; they indicate water depth, note rocky (rky) areas and wrecks, boulders (bLd) and shoals. The charts show Lighthouses and lighted aids; you can decipher one from another (G"I"FLG 45).

Boats with depth sounder transducers mounted astern should not rely solely on the sounders reading. Shoal areas, with quick depth changes, could place you hard aground by the bow while still showing good water depth astern. The use of a chart can show you where the shoals are and give you time to change course.

The ability to navigate by a chart is invaluable. Area Charts are the most reliable; most have "blow-ups" displaying local rivers and ports— an advantage when cruising somewhere unfamiliar.

To learn about charting, look for the latest edition of Chapman's Piloting, or check out the Power Squadron or Coast Guard Auxiliary classes.

Directions:

From the South or West:

Mass Turnpike (Rte 90) - Take Exit 2 (Lee) on the Mass Turnpike — after exiting, turn right and follow Rte 20 West. Approximately 4 miles Rte 7 North merges with Rte 20. Continue on Rte 7 North about 28 miles to Williamstown. The Williams Inn is on the left of the Village Green at the Northerly Junction of Rtes 7 & 2. Go around the traffic circle about 270 degrees — The Williams Inn is located on the north side of the circle.

Or


Rte 7 North from Danbury to Williamstown.

Or

Taconic State Parkway North towards Albany. Take last exit before the toll - Rte 295 East (Chatham & East Chatham), to Rte 22 North to Rte 43 East to Rte 7 North to Williamstown.

From the North:

Route 87 South to Exit 6 (Rte 2 East into Latham). Take Route 2 East through Troy and over the mountain and down to Williamstown. Turn left at the junction of Routes 2 & 7. Continue 2 miles North on Rte 7 to Williamstown.
