Cruising in Maine by Tom and Bev Gilbert

We thought we would submit an article for the Berkshire Log highlighting our 8-day cruise in Maine that we completed in early in August on our boat share Hanse 400. While we heard from Connecticut cruising friends that it was in high 90's on shore during our cruise, we experienced offshore breezes making sailing with Fleeces preferable, and sleeping weather that was very comfortable.

Prevailing winds had us Jibing downwind to get up Penobscot bay for our Camden destination. Our Dutchman Boom Brake and Preventer worked flawlessly. The following day we proceeded to beat upwind to exit Penobscot Bay on our way to Tenants Harbor. The selftacking 90% jib not only made tacking effortless, but also made our regular avoidance of lobster pots a non-event.

We unintentionally arrived in Rockland just in time for their annual lobster fest. We were on our way down the dock when we got hijacked by marina members to attend their dock party - \$8 per person and all the soft-shell lobsters you can eat and, of course homemade fixings like our rendezvous. We met some really great people on the dock, who changed our intended float plan.

We were convinced at the party that we had to go to Camden. In Camden, we were surrounded by schooners of all sizes in the inner harbor, and it truly looked like a movie set (Peyton's place movie produced around 1957 was filmed here). We met a family the prior day that said they were rocking a lot in the outer harbor with southwest



swells, and another person told us to pick up a "harbor float" in the_inner harbor (a mooring with a 30-foot dock attached). We did so and shared our dock with another transient with a boat named "bottle of red". Naturally we took a day off from lobster because our new friends invited us over for, well, a "bottle of red".

Tenants Harbor was a relatively quiet harbor (even for

Maine), with mostly lobster fisherman. There was a post office and general store that we were told had no sign, "but you can't miss it", and of course a lobster

shack. We had nothing to mail, so all that was left was Luke's Lobster Shack - a local place that not only had great lobster, but one of the best and most interesting salads (Beverly's idea for a salad, not mine).

We chose Boothbay Harbor to ride out thunderstorms and fog - not a bad place to be stuck for 2 days. Apparently in Boothbay Harbor each mooring comes with its own lobster pot off the transom, or at least ours did (see photo on previous page)

We visited Monhegan island – the island with the tag line of "12 miles out". We spent the day on several of their many spectacular hiking trails. The views from the hiking trails along the cliffs were amazing (see photo)

Our favorite Transom Showers occurred regularly after sundown during our cruise in the less populated coves.

This is our second consecutive summer cruising in Maine, and we left again wanting more. Still uncharted cruising grounds for us is eastern side of Penobscot Bay going east to Mt Desert/Bar Harbor. And we have yet to discover Portland to the eastern edge of



Cape Cod Canal. If anyone happens to see us in that region next summer standing on the dock with our knapsacks and water bottles, you will know that we are ready, willing, and able crew looking to hop aboard. So we find ourselves once again in search of a boat – apparently similar to the recurring need of Captain Jack Sparrow.

Moby's Helpful Hints

CLEANING PROCEDURE FOR THE GPS CHART PLOTTER SCREEN

Cleaning of the chart plotter screen is a very important operation and must be done carefully. Since the surface is covered by an antireflective coating, the procedure for cleaning all the surfaces can be performed using the following procedure:

Use a clean, soft, lint-free cloth to clean the glass .We recommend using a micro-fiber cloth. . Spray a small amount of ammonia-free cleaner (isopropyl alcohol onto the cloth. Spraying on the cloth will prevent overspray.

Fold the cloth or lens cloth into a triangular shape, moisten the tip and use the index finger behind a corner to move the cloth across the surface in overlapping side to side strokes.

If the cloth is too wet , a noticeable wet film will be left in its path and you will have to repeat the process. If too dry, the cloth won't glide easily, and may damage the surface.

Kitchen Hints

Make your salad ingredients at home and bring in separate Ziploc bags. When you need salad simply add the desired amounts into the salad bowls toss to mix. Use the empty bags for saving leftovers or to avoid garbage smells.

Need hot water and don't have a hot water heater? When you're boiling water for other things, boil extra and save it in a thermos for use during the day.
