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

Topics in the Coast Pilot include channel descriptions, anchorages, bridge and cable clearances, currents, tide and water levels, prominent features, pilotage, towage, weather, ice conditions, wharf descriptions, dangers, routes, traffic separation schemes, small-craft facilities, and Federal regulations applicable to navigation.

Appendix C contains the United States Coast Guard's combined International and Inland Navigation Rules, their Annexes and associated Federal rules and regulations.

## U.S. Department of Homeland Security United States Coast Guard



BOSTON— Coast Guard Station Burlington crewmembers rescued a woman recently in the evening after her 17-foot boat capsized on Lake Champlain near Schuyler Island.

Local emergency dispatchers relayed the distress call to watchstanders at the station at approximately 7:27 p.m. The woman had used her cell phone to call 911 and provide her location.

A 29-foot response boat crew launched and arrived on scene at approximately 7:56 p.m. The woman signaled to the crew by waiving her phone's flashlight.

"She helped aid in her own rescue by wearing a life jacket and storing her phone in a waterproof case," said Kenneth Stuart, the command duty officer at Coast Guard Sector Northern New England's command center.

A plan for salvaging the boat is pending.


## LED Lights Safety Alert

A recent article in *WindCheck* called attention to a Coast Guard alert about LED lights. These lights may cause VHF poor reception, as well as, poor Automatic Identification System (AIS) reception. It would be helpful to increase the distance between LED light and the antenna for these devices.



Power cords are notorious for getting very dirty. A recent article in *Good Old Boat* magazine suggested the following. Using industrial strength gloves, rub the cord with an acetone soaked rag(s). Then apply a good paste wax, buff it off when it is dry to protect it.
