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GOING AGROUND or What to Do When Your Bottom Hits the Bottom Published with permission of <u>Boating Times Long Island</u>

Ohmigosh – we've run aground! Ugly words, aren't they? But, unless you're far offshore, you may be faced with shallow waters and narrow channels and you have to know what to do when your bottom hits the bottom.

First is safety! After having everyone put on a life preserver, determine if you, your crew, or your passengers are hurt. Cruising into an immoveable bottom at 15 or 20 knots can cause people to fly about. If someone has been hurt, determine the nature of their injury and whether they need medical assistance. If so, use your VHF radio to call for help.

The second concern is for your boat. Check your bilges to see if there are any holes (you'll quickly notice water). Your boat won't immediately sink, but you will need to prevent your vessel from getting into deeper waters. If you can repair the hole(s), great! If not, call for help.

There are several ways to get your boat back into the water:

- You can wait until the tide comes in and your boat floats again. Watch that wind or current doesn't push your boat further into shallow water; consider setting an anchor.
- If your boat is small enough, someone can jump over and push it into deeper water in his or her PFD with a lifeline attached to the boat. Remember to turn your engine(s) off. On a sailboat, have those aboard go to one side or the other to help get the centerboard or keel off the ground.
- If your boat has outboard or inboard-outboard engines, you may be able to raise the lower unit so that the propellers are off the bottom enough to motor into deep water. Don't try to motor off with inboard engines as you may suck sand into the water intakes.
- You can use a method called "kedging," which entails setting an anchor and using it to pull your boat back into deeper water.
- Call for help. If you have a towing contract, call your provider. If not, emergency services will assist in calling a commercial towing service.

Can you prevent going aground in the first place? One answer is to know the waters that you're in and to have current charts available. The United States Power Squadrons® offers a complete education program designed for recreational boaters. Take advantage of these classes and other available education for an edge in keeping your bottom off the bottom.

EPIRB/PLB

The Life You Save Could Be Your Own!

If you plan to GO OFFSHORE – (Atlantic, Pacific, Great Lakes, and the Gulf of Mexico) – consider taking an EPIRB and PLB. It could save your life!

An Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon (EPIRB) is used to alert search and rescue services in the event of an emergency. It does this by transmitting a coded message on the 406 MHz distress frequency to a satellite that is



then relayed by earth stations to the nearest rescue coordination center within moments of activation. EPIRBs that are equipped with a built-in GPS enables the rescue sources to more accurately identify your position and respond to the emergency.

Personal Location Beacons (PLB) are another type of 406 MHz emergency signaling devise. Usually smaller than an EPIRB, these devices are designed for individual personal use. There are many models available and functions can vary. These are not recommended for maritime use unless they are fully waterproof and can be submerged.

Choose the device that suites your needs and is right for your boating situation. Proper registration of your EPIRB or PLB is essential. This should be done at the time of purchase. You must provide the correct information to:






Volunteers Help in Connecticut:

Pigs In A Bag! You've heard of "Pigs in a Blanket" right? Well, here's our version in a Bag!!

- 1 large Reynolds Foil Bag (or any brand)
- 2 1 lb. of Sausage (Use Hillshire Smoked Sausage Ring)
- 3 1 large Onion, chopped
- 4 1 large Green Pepper, chopped
- 5 4-5 Potatoes, chopped (leave the skins on)
- 6 Olive Oil
- 7 2 TBSP. chopped Garlic
- 8 1 tsp. Crushed Red Peppers
- 9 For those of you who love hot peppers, you may also add them to this recipe. I use 2-3 hot peppers, chopped

Pour 2-3 TBSP. of Olive Oil in bag and add everything else. Close bag and place on a preheated grill. Turn bag often to prevent food from burning. Grill for approx. 25 minutes over med. heat. Carefully open bag and serve on platter. This recipe is quick, easy and taste great.
